

- In view of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") has vide its circular dated May 5, 2020 read with circulars dated April 8, 2020 and April 13, 2020 (collectively referred to as "MCA Circulars") permitted holding of the Annual General Meeting of companies through Video Conferencing or Other Audio Visual Means ("VC/OAVM"), without physical presence of the Members at a common venue.
- 2. Incompliance with applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") read with the MCA Circulars, the 57th Annual General Meeting of the Company is being conducted through Video Conferencing ("VC") (hereinafter referred to as "AGM" or "e-AGM"). In accordance with the Secretarial Standard-2 on General Meeting issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI) read with Guidance/Clarification dated April, 15, 2020 issued by ICSI, the proceedings of the AGM shall be deemed to be conducted at the Registered Office of the Company which shall be the deemed Venue of the e-AGM.
- 3. Since this AGM is being held pursuant to the MCA Circulars through VC, physical attendance of Members has been dispensed with. Further as per the MCA Circulars, the facility for appointment of proxies by the Members will not be available for the e- AGM.
- 4. Corporate Members intending to send their authorized representative(s) to attend the Meeting are requested to send a certified copy of the Board resolution authorizing their representative to attend and vote on their behalf at the Meeting.

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FROM THE CHAIRMAN'S DESK

Dear Esteemed Member-Exporters,

First of all, I hope all of you are now eagerly thinking and awaiting an end of these present Pandemic COVID 19 outbreaks which was officially declared by the World Health Organization as a global pandemic in view of its alarming levels of severity. Besides its worrying effects on human life, the Coronavirus has significantly slowed down the global economy, initially being China, which is the central manufacturing hub of many global business operations.

Taking into account the future effect of the COVID 19 outbreak, initially, the Department of Chemicals & Petrochemicals in the Ministry of Chemicals & Fertilizers had organized a meeting with representatives of the Industry associations and various stakeholders meetings during the first week of March, 2020 to discuss the disruption in the Chemicals and Petrochemicals Sector and consequent shutdown of various segment of the Chinese industry as supply chain of Chemicals from China was also significantly disrupted globally due the said pandemic .

Taking into account the day to day developments and the serious nature of the COVID-19 outbreak as a precautionary measure, it was decided to close down most of the Offices specially in Mumbai, except essential services, almost a week in the last week of March, 2020 and further to function it every alternate days or closed even for weeks together due to frequent lockdown being declared by the Government of India from time to time to effectively control it which affected most of the industries.

However, in its 'Mission Begin Again' Guidelines of the Government of Maharashtra in accordance with the Central Government's Unlock plan 1.0, after announcing several guidelines and relaxations amid the extension of frequent lockdown in Maharashtra to control the pandemic COVID 19 outbreak, the State Government permitted all its Government Offices to start functioning with 15% Staff strength and Private Offices with 10% Staff Strength in a phased manner which commenced from 8th June, 2020 as per the guidelines of the Ministry of Home Affairs. Accordingly, CHEMEXCIL Office also started functioning as per the said directive.

In order to understand and sort out the trade related issues of the member-exporters during the lockdown period, the Ministry of Commerce & Industry had organized several meetings with the respective Ministries of Chemicals & Fertilizers and the Agriculture as also at various Ministers level, wherein their various issues were discussed extensively and resolved it to the maximum extent.



I glad to inform you that the Commerce Ministry has also taken several other measures to address hardships faced by exporters due to COVID-19 pandemic which included providing several relaxations/extensions of various compliance deadlines, extension of foreign trade policy by one year, export obligation under advance authorization and export promotion of capital goods scheme, last date for filing claims under services and goods export from India schemes.

For taking all the above actions, on behalf of all member-exporters of CHEMEXCIL, I am thankful to all the concerned Officials in the said Ministries. CHEMEXCIL had coordinated as also continuously followed up with the said Ministries by way of taking up the issues of the exporters even during this pandemic with limited infrastructure.

I am also thankful to the Ministry of MSME for taking an important decision of revising the definition of MSME by enhancing both, the limits of investment in plant & machinery as well as turnover besides excluding export turnover from the aggregate turnover. Accordingly, the new definition has done away with the difference between manufacturing and services entities.

However, we came to know some time back that the Ministry had issued a clarification, according to which traders are not the part of the MSME and if that is the case, the same needs revision in view of the new criteria and merging of manufacturers and services in the new definition. Further, since Merchant exporters are also instrumental in boosting country's exports especially they provide value added services like marketing, distribution and logistics to MSME units, on behalf of the Merchant exporters, CHEMEXCIL recently made a representation to the Ministry of MSME with endorsement to the DoC, MoC&I recommending and urging the Ministry to issue a suitable notification that Merchant exporters are eligible to get the benefit of the new definition of MSME and outcome of the same is awaited.

I also know that there are lot of other issues covering regulatory and infrastructural and all these issues are being discussed time and again by the Council with the said Ministries in various forums and the Council is also trying her level best to ensure the Government's perspective that 'Make in India, Atmanirbhar Bharat_and the global leadership which India is leading, will support to overcome the pandemic COVID 19 outbreak.

As you are aware, there are many Embedded Taxes & Levies such as Electricity duty, VAT on Natural Gas, Mandi Tax, water charges, taxes on petroleum products etc. which are out of GST and are not fully refunded and add to the costs of chemical exporters. These taxes are refunded in ready- made garments/ made ups industry under RoSCTL scheme, but not for other sectors. To strengthen our case, in August 2019, Council has submitted a report toDoC on embedded taxes and refund mechanism for Chemexcil Products. This report was prepared by a professional agency after consultations/ meetings with our members at various locations. This report has recommended fixation of Chapter wise rates for itemsunder council's purview.

Subsequently, you might recall that in Sept 2019, Government had announced Remission of Duties and Taxes on Exported Products (RoDTEP) scheme for neutralisation of various un refunded levies and Taxes on Export products. This scheme was supposed to replace MEIS from Jan 2020. In this regard, DOC had sought data from councils in the specified formats (R1, R2 & R3) and



was submitted by the council as per responses received. However, the launch of RODTEP was postponed till Dec 2020 to allow time to work out the rates.

In addition to taking up various issues of the member-exporters with different Departments of the said Ministries, Council conducted Video Conference Meetings of all its Panels successfully and discussed the trade related issues faced by the panel members as also to suggest measures to resolve the same in order to boost exports of the respective Panel. In addition to this, as per the suggestion of the Department of Commerce, MoC&I, the Council created a WhatsApp Group of its COA members and has been interacting with them frequently to know problems of the member-exporters of their respective Panel and their suggestions to resolve it wherever required.

Further, the Council has already nominated Regional Chairmen for its all Regions recently to coordinate the Regional Offices and its members to discuss and understand their problems and resolve it to the maximum extent.

The 6th Edition of CAPINDIA 2020 which was scheduled from 15th to 17th Dec. 2020 in Mumbai has been postponed as per the request from the Stakeholders along with the DoC, Ministry of Commerce & Industry due to the outbreak of COVID 19. Member-exporters have already been intimated the same. Likewise, the Export Award Function of the Council which was scheduled on 16th March, 2020 was postponed till further notice due to the COVID 19 outbreaks.

Further I would like to inform you that although the DoC, MoC&I had already approved/sanctioned almost 19 overseas Export Promotional events, but due to the outbreak of COVID 19, the same were also either postponed or cancelled till the situation comes to normal.

It gives me immense pleasure to inform you all that during this financial year, Council has purchased 3 properties one each in Bengaluru, Kolkata & New Delhi.

Before concluding, I would also like to have valuable suggestions/views of all our member-exporters so as to further improve the export promotional activities of the Council during this Pandemic. I am sure, all of us will courageously face this situation and will try our level best to come out of this situation successfully for which please be assured that CHEMEXCIL will always be with you.

Some of the major points discussed/decisions taken in the above meetings are listed below:

- As part of its export promotional activities, CHEMEXCIL had organized more than 24
 Educative Seminars/Membership drives in different parts of the region in co-ordination with
 its Regional Offices, respective associations and accordingly, CHEMEXCIL was able to enroll
 a considerable number of new members;
- 2. Immediately after announcement of the Union Budget for 2020-21, a special Seminar was organized by the Council with M/s. Lakshmikumaran & Sridharan (Attorneys) on 12th February, 2020 in the Conference Room of the Council for Analysis of the Union Budget.
- 3. With regard to the long-standing problem being faced by the industries on the order of National Green Tribunal (NGT) and resolving the same, CHEMEXCIL took up the same with the respective Government department
- 4. The Chairman of the Council, Shri Ajay Kadakia briefed the members on the joint Meeting of Board of Trade and Council of Trade Development & Promotion which he attended on 6th June, 2019 in New Delhi chaired by the Hon'ble Union Minister of Commerce & Industry, Shri Piyush Goyal. The meeting was attended by Chairmen of All EPCs, 50 members from major Industry Associations, representatives of some of the Banks, All State Ministers and all Secretaries of different Ministries. The meeting was also attended by both the Union Ministers of State for Commerce & Industry.
- 5. Council had already organized an educative seminar in Mumbai on K-REACH and another Seminar in Ahmedabad.
- 6. Council has been sending data on the export strategy/analysis of export of the items coming under the purview of CHEMEXCIL regularly to the Ministry every month.



- Council has received approval for Amendments of its Bye Laws from Department of Commerce, Ministry of Commerce & Industry, Government of India vide letter - F.No.5/2/2018-EP(CAP) dtd. 2nd August, 2019, which was also approved and registered by the RoC.
- 8. Based on the Amended Bye Laws of the Council, CHEMEXCIL called for election of 15 posts in the Committee of Administration, for which Department of Commerce, Ministry of Commerce & Industry, Government of India appointed Shri Sambhaji Chavan, ITS, Jt. DGFT from the Office of the Addl. DGFT, Mumbai as Election Authority (Returning Officer), under whom the election was conducted vide Circular No. Addl. DGFT/MUM/CHEMEXCIL/Election 2019-20 dtd. 21st November, 2019 and the results of elected members from each Panel for the Committee of Administration for the years 2019-20 & 2020-21 were declared.
- 9. CHEMEXCIL participated in the meeting called by the Union Minister of Commerce and Industry and Railways on 19th December, 2019 at New Delhi with the Export Promotion Councils/Commodity Boards to deliberate on the suggestions for review of Foreign Trade Policy 2015-20 as also performance of EPCs/Commodity Boards.
- 10. CoA was briefed on the claims of the member-exporters, towards reimbursement of Registration charges incurred to them for their 3rd Phase of REACH Registration, which were submitted to Department of Commerce and Industry, Government of India in 4-different lots.



EXPORT PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

REACH:

Council recommended applications for reimbursement of 50% registration charges received from 186 companies who had registered their 633 substances under the EU REACH.

The Ministry of Commerce vide their sanction letters K-11020/687/2019-E&MDA-DoC dtd 21.02.20; K-11020/27/2020-E&MDA-DoC dtd 27.02.20 and K-11020/43/2020-E&MDA-DoC dtd 06.03.20 sanctioned an amount of Rs 12,25,63,730/- incurred to 176 companies for registration of their 533 substances under EU –REACH. The balance claims are under consideration for sanction by the Ministry of Commerce.

The Council will disburse the Grant in Aid received for 176 companies after completion of formalities by eligible companies as per Council's procedure.

The Council had processed the 95 MAI claims for the year 2019-20 received from the member-exporters for the participating in export promotional activities as per details given below:

OVERSEAS TRADE DISPUTE

The Council received representations from exporters on overseas trade disputes related to delay in exports payment, supply of sub-standard materials etc. As a follow-up action, letters were sent to Indian Missions abroad for intervention.

INFORMATION TO MEMBERS

The Council disseminates information to member-exporters pertaining to DGFT/CBIC/RBI/ GST/ FTA, etc. notifications. Information received on Anti-Dumping Investigations, TBT/SPS Measures etc were also passed on to the members as well as uploaded on website.

INTERNATIONAL TRADE ENQUIRIES

The International Trade Enquiries received by the Council from potential importers and Indian Missions abroad were circulated to concerned Manufacturers Exporters and also put on our website.

NON PREFERENTIAL CERTIFICATE OF ORIGIN:

A number of Member-Exporters are approaching the Council requesting for issuance of Certificates of Origin (Non-preferential) and attestations connected with documents like Export Invoice, etc. in respect of their products exported by them to various overseas countries. The Council scrutinizes the said documents received from them and issues certificates accordingly.

During this year, 152 Certificates of Origin (Non-preferential) were issued to the member exporters.

VISA RECOMMENDATION LETTERS:

A number of applications are being received by the Council from the Member-Exporters from time to time requesting for recommendation letters to various foreign missions in India for issuance of Visa in favour of their officials as also Officers of the Council, for their visit abroad in connection with export promotional activities. Their applications are being scrutinized by the Council and Recommendation letters are issued to them accordingly.

During the year under review, **260** Recommendation letters for Visa were issued by the Council to various Foreign Missions in India in favour of our Member-exporters as well as Officers of the Council.

EXPORT PERFORMANCE CERTIFICATE

Council has issued export performance certificate to member exporters on there request which has helped them import under Advance Authorization / EPCG without Bank Guarantee.



OVERVIEW OF INDIAN DYESTUFF INDUSTRY

The Indian dyestuff industry plays a vital role in the economic development of the country. It is one of the core chemical industries in India. It is also the second highest export segment in the chemical industry. Maharashtra and Gujarat account for 90% of dyestuff production in India due to the availability of raw materials and dominance of textile industry in these regions. The major users of dyes in India are textiles, paper, plastics, printing ink and foodstuff industries. The textiles sector consumes around 80% of the total production due to high demand for polyester and cotton, globally.

At present, India contributes about 16% of the share in the global market with a CAGR of more than 15% in the last decade. The dye markets are mostly dominated by reactive and disperse dyes. The demand for reactive and disperse dyes is expected to grow in future as these two dyes are dominant in all the regions. The demand for reactive and disperse dyes are common in all the regions whereas disperse vat and other dyes are stagnant. In the Asian region, China, Korea and Taiwan are strong players in disperse dyes, while India leads in the production of reactive dyes due to an availability of intermediate vinyl sulphone in the country.


The growth of dye sector in the future continues to depend on the performance of end user industries like paints, textiles, printing inks, paper, plastics and foodstuffs. The changing customer preferences, boom and expansion of infrastructure in certain parts of the world creates new market opportunities for the dye industry. The industry is likely to see many new dyeing technologies coming into the market with the help of good technical expertise and R&D achievements.

It is a known fact that Normally China was the main Intermediates supplier of Global markets and many of the Dyes & Dye Intermediates Industries in China are facing Environmental Problems as a result maximum companies are closed down their production. Since they are not able to fulfil global demand of the said products, global players are now procuring such materials from India and therefore, therefore exports of Dyestuffs from India are showing increasing trend.

The total export performance of Dyes and Dye Intermediates during the period April 2019 to March, 2020 is US \$ 2880 million as compared to US \$ 2816 million of the corresponding period of previous year, registering a growth of 2%.



EXPORTS OF DYES (CHAPTER 32) & DYE INTERMEDIATES (CHAPTER 29)



OVERVIEW OF INDIAN CHEMICAL INDUSTRY

The country's chemical industry is one of the fastest growing in the world, currently ranked the third largest in Asia and sixth globally with respect to output after the US, China, Germany, Japan and Korea.

The domestic chemical industry's growth is largely driven by country's consumption growth story and the per capita consumption of chemicals in the country is 1/10th of world average with India a low consumption country even among developing nations. This makes India a very attractive destination to invest and grow. Further, the Indian chemical companies have started focusing on global markets for investments. The significantly growing domestic market and the upheaval in international markets, particularly with respect to China, augur well with opportunities for the Indian chemical industry to rapidly grow in size and capability.

The growth drivers for the Indian Chemical industry are rising demand in end-use segments, expanding exports fueled by increasing export competitiveness, a large population and dependence on agriculture, etc. in addition to global shift towards Asia as the World's chemicals manufacturing hub. Moreover, the Chinese chemical industry is stagnating due to tightening pollution control, labour costs etc. This encourages exports from India, being the closest international surrogate for chemical products globally.

Specialty chemicals provides a wide variety of effects or performance which many other industry sectors rely on. Thus, the specialty chemicals are also known as performance chemicals or effect chemicals, as these materials perform some functions or produce some effects. India exports specialty chemicals to Asia-Pacific countries where it scores on competitive scale of production and also to developed countries of Europe and USA.

As India gains increased traction from major countries, looking at investment in the Indian chemical sector, both driven entrepreneurs and a positive government need to put their combined vigor to grow the chemical industry multi-fold in the coming decade.


India is currently the 4th largest manufacturer of agrochemicals after the United States, Japan and China.

The Government of India through its 'Make In India' initiative has been inviting various national and international companies to manufacture and expand operations in India. Many companies are now looking to source chemicals from India in order to de-risk their sourcing from China. India has been traditionally exporting agrochemicals to the US, Europe and some Latin American countries. However there tremendous export potential to markets such as Africa, Middle East and East Asia. In short, the current Indian Agrochemical scenario presents an exciting growth opportunity for chemical manufacturers.

The total export performance of Basic Inorganic, Organic and Agro chemicals during the period April 2019 to March, 2020 is US \$ 12729 million as compared to US \$ 13592 million of the corresponding period of previous year, registering a decline in growth by 6%



OVERVIEW OF INDIAN COSMETICS, TOILETRIES & ESSENTIAL OIL INDUSTRY

The increasing healthcare awareness especially during the current global pandemic situation coupled with rising disposable income has categorized soaps and detergents as an essential consumable product in the developed as well as developing regions. Soaps and detergents are vital necessities as consumer goods are used by the large population base. The vendors are expanding their business by building manufacturing facilities in the developing economies such as China and India, which have high potential in terms of revenue. Therefore, the potential opportunities in the developing economies are expected to provide ample of demand for the product.

It has been reported that Asia Pacific region is projected to grow at a highest rate from 2019. The steady growing textile market of the region is expected to provide a stable demand for the soaps and detergent products. The rising population of the region coupled with rapid urbanization in countries such as India, China, Indonesia, and Malaysia is expected to be the key driver for the rising demand for the said items.

You may be aware that social media & favorable demographics are playing an important role in spreading awareness about cosmetic products and developing fashion consciousness, not only in metros but also in tier-1 & 2 cities. Further, herbal cosmetics products are driving growth due to increasing adoption, and the segment alone is expected to grow at 15%.

The Indian cosmetics industry caters to the population by two channels - organized and unorganized. With the compelling demand for branded products, the Indian cosmetics industry has opened up the market to foreign brands for investment. Indian cosmetic companies, especially of herbal brands are establishing their overseas footprints.


The overall Essential oils industry has seen significant growth in recent years. Changing consumer lifestyles, as well as rising disposable income of the consumers in the developing countries is stimulating the growth of this market. In recent years, the awareness about medicinal properties of essential oils has increased; this has led to a significant increase in the use of essential oils in pharmaceuticals. Furthermore, the rising concerns about depletion and exploitation of natural resources is expected to pose a restraint to the growth of essential oils market.

The global essential oils market is projected to register an estimated CAGR of 9.2%, during the forecast period, 2018-2023. The essential oils market is expected to project a significant growth in the near future.

The total export performance of Cosmetics, Soaps, Toiletries and Essential Oils during the period April 2019 to March, 2020 is US \$ 1914 million as compared to US \$ 1848 million of the corresponding period of previous year, registering a growth of 4%.



PANEL 4: CASTOR OIL (CHAPTER 15)

OVERVIEW OF INDIAN CASTOR OIL INDUSTRY

India meets 90 per cent of the global demand of castor oil. India's exports of castor oil and derivatives are estimated to be worth over Rs 7,500 crore (\$ 1.1 billion) per annum. The global castor derivatives market estimated to be over \$3 billion is highly dependent on India.

Owing to its unique chemical structure and rich properties, Castor oil and its derivatives find uses in many industries such as cosmetics, food, lubricants, paints, agriculture, pharmaceuticals, perfumeries, inks & adhesives, textile chemicals, etc. After plant oils, castor oil is considered to be the most required oil. However, growing concerns pertaining to biofuels specially biodiesel and biopolymer across the globe is pushing castor oil.


Castor Oil price is closely related to crude oil price and since Crude Oil price is going down it has also affected the price of Castor Oil realizing lower price than expected. However, recently Crude Oil prices having started firming up, it is hoped that Castor Oil price will come up and we will be in a position to realize higher and better price for export of Castor Oil from India.

Although there is apprehension about the downward trend in exports of Castor Oil, there is good opportunity for India for value added derivatives of castor oil if incentivized adequately.



Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

- b) The Council needs to strengthen its internal control in recording of transactions and maintaining books of accounts.
 - Our report is not modified in respect of these matters.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

We consider quantitative materiality and qualitative factors in (i) Planning the scope of our audit work and in evaluating the results of our work and (ii) To evaluate the effect of an identified misstatements in the financial statements.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Notes forming Part of Financial Statements

Council's Information:

Basic Chemicals, Cosmetics & Dyes Export Promotion Council popularly known as CHEMEXCIL is set up by the Ministry of Commerce & Industry Government of India in the year 1963 with the objective of promoting exports of the Dyes and Dye Intermediates, Basic Inorganic & Organic Chemicals, including Agrochemicals, Cosmetics, Soaps, Toiletries & Essential Oils, Specialty Chemicals, Lubricants and Castor oil. The Council has been registered as a Company under the provisions of the 'Companies Act, 1956 (hereinafter called as the "Act"). By virtue of the license granted to the Council by the Central Government under Section 25 (now governed by section 8 of the Companies Act 2013) of the 'Act' the word "LIMITED" is not required to be suffixed to its name. The Council also to holds the registration certificate under Section 12AA of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

1. Significant Accounting Policies:

1.1 General:

- a) The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention, in accordance with applicable accounting standards and on the principle of a going concern.
- b) All income and expenses to the extent considered receivable and payable, respectively with reasonable certainty are accounted for on accrual basis.
- c) Membership subscription which remains unpaid as at the close of the year is not accounted for except the amount actually received out of such unpaid subscriptions approximately one month prior to the approval of the financial statements by the Committee of Administration.
- d) Entrance Fees receipts are credited to General Reserve.
- e) Library books are charged to Income & Expenditure Account in the year of purchase.

1.2 Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements is in conformity with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). It requires Committee of Administration to make estimates and assumptions that affects the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of financial statements and reported amounts of revenue and expenses for that year. Actual results could differ from these estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively.

1.3 Property, Plant and Equipment (Fixed Assets):

Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation/amortization without any adjustment for Government Grant received, if any, for their purchase.



1.4 Depreciation/Amortization and Impairment:

Depreciation on Fixed Assets is provided on written down value method at the useful life specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 (hereinafter referred to as the 'Act').

a. Impairment of Assets:

- i. The Council assesses the carrying amount of assets at each Balance Sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the Council estimates the recoverable amount of the assets. The recoverable amount is estimated as the higher of the net realizable value and the value in use with an impairment loss being recognized whenever the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount.
- ii. A previously recognized impairment loss on assets is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount, however not to the extent higher than the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognized in prior years.

1.5 Revenue Recognition:

a) Contribution from Members:

Contributions receivable from Members for participation in Exhibition, Delegation, Seminar Fees are recognized as income as and when the respective activities are completed and/or on receipt basis in view of uncertainty.

b) Government Grants:

Grants from Government are credited to Income and Expenditure Account on receipt basis as it is not possible to ascertain, the quantum of Grant due & receivable from/refundable to the Ministry of Commerce and Industry with reasonable certainty/accuracy.

1.6 Transaction in Foreign Currency:

Transactions in foreign currency are recorded at the rate of exchange in force at the time of occurrence of the transaction.

Monetary - Current assets and current liabilities in foreign currency at the year-end are stated at the rate of exchange in force as on that date and the resultant gain / (loss) is recognized in the Income and Expenditure Account.

1.7 Employee Benefits:

- a) Contribution for Provident Fund (based on a certain percentage of salary) is funded into an approved Trust.
- b) Gratuity is charged to Income and Expenditure Account on the basis of actuarial valuation as at the year end and funded into an approved Trust.
- c) Leave Entitlement Benefits are provided for on the basis of actuarial valuation as at the year end.



1.8 Provision and Contingent Liabilities:

- a) Provisions are recognized for liabilities that can be measured only by using a substantial degree of estimation, if
 - a. The Council has a present obligation as a result of a past event;
 - b. A probable outflow of resources is expected to settle the obligation; and
 - c. The amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.
- b) Where some or all of the expenditure required to settle a provision is expected to be reimbursed by another party, such reimbursement is recognized to the extent of provision or contingent liability as the case may be, only when it is virtually certain that the reimbursement will be received.
- c) Contingent liability, if material, is disclosed in the case of:
 - a. A present obligation arising from a past event, when it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.
 - b. A possible obligation, unless the probability of outflow of resources is remote.

19. Notes to Financial Statements:

19.1 a) With regards to premises at Jhansi Castle, the Structural Audit carried out M/s. V.J. Joshi & Associates and as per their report dated 26th April, 2017, "The building is more than 70 years old and general overall observation indicates that the building is substantially deteriorated at many places and if urgent repairs are not done, it may lead to fatal accidents." The Council is occupying premises at 4th floor (as sub tenant to Indian Trade Promotion Organization (ITPO) and 5th floor (as statutory tenant) of the aforesaid Jhansi Castle since 1971. Management is making efforts to carry out necessary repairs of the building.

b) The Council has made settlement with Prakriti Trading Company with regard to the arrears of rent for 5th floor of the aforesaid Jhansi Castle and has made payment of Rs.4,361,248 (including stale cheques of Rs.2,003,543) towards settlement for the period from 01-04-2005 to 31-12-2019. The Council is paying rent of Rs. 20,416 per month regularly from 01-01-2020 based on the settlement.

19.3 The expenses in respect of code-activities are subject to sanction / confirmation of the Government of India and Grant-in-aid received from the Ministry of Commerce and Industry is subject to adjustments as may be necessary in view of any Government Audit observations, non/partial fulfillment of certain conditions, if any as may be observed by them for eligibility of such Grant-in-aid, clarifications by the Council and final decision of the Ministry.

During the year, Audit has been carried out for Financial Year 2016-17 to 2018-19 by Indian Audit and Accounts Department, Office of the principal Director of Commercial Audit and Exofficio member, Audit board-I, Mumbai and have issued a report of observations dated 25th February, 2020. As informed, the Council has replied to the observations by mail on 16th October, 2020 which has subsequently been adopted by the Committee of Administration and it does not expect any material impact on the financials.



- 19.4 The Council generally classifies its expenditure in accordance with the format given by Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India. (Refer Note-15 and 16 of Financial Statement)

- 19.15 In March 2020, the WHO declared the COVID-19 outbreak as a pandemic which continues to spread across the country. On 25th March, 2020, the Government of India has declared this pandemic a health emergency, ordered temporarily closure of all non-essential businesses/ activities, imposed restrictions on movement of goods/material, travel, etc.

As the nature of activities performed by the Council majorly fell under non-essential category, these restrictions had substantially reduced its activities. The Council has since, not commenced its activities which involves performance of or participation in exhibitions in India and abroad for promotion of export of its members.

Considering the current situation, the activities of Council will be significantly impacted for the FY 2020-21 and it is in the process of evaluating the impact and measures to be adopted for the same. The impact of the global health pandemic may be different from that estimated as at the date of approval of these financial statements. Considering the continuing uncertainties, the Council will continue to closely monitor any material changes to future economic conditions.
