

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FROM THE CHAIRMAN'S DESK

Dear Esteemed Member-exporters,

Greetings from CHEMEXCIL, Mumbai!

As you are aware, the implementation of Goods and ServicesTax (GST) with effect from 1st July, 2017, has been the biggest game-changing tax reform in India since Independence. Subsuming over 17 indirect taxes levied by the Central and State Governments into one, it is expected to lead to substantial reduction in compliance costs for businesses. In the long run, hopefully it will also help the MSMEs as they will be less dependent on tax experts when compared to the earlier regime, due to a simplified return filing system in place. Rationalization of the composition scheme and introduction of quarterly filing option for taxpayers having turnover of below ₹ 1.5 crores was a wise decision of the Government. More importantly, it is going to eliminate the cascading effect of tax that was evident earlier.

Pursuant to the roll out of GST, the Union Finance Ministry has renamed the Central Board of Excise and Customs (CBEC) as "Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC)", w.e.f. 29th March 2018. The said change was already proposed by the Finance Ministry in its Union Budget for 2018. The change of name from CBEC to CBIC was necessitated due to the new indirect tax regime.

In this context, I would like to inform my colleagues that before implementation of GST, for the benefit of member-exporters of the Council, CHEMEXCIL in co-ordination with the Service Tax Officials had organized awareness seminars on GST at various Regions. The First of such Seminar was organized at Mumbai on 9th May 2017 followed by Ahmedabad on 9th June, 2017, Bengaluru on 14th July-2017, again at Mumbai on 26th July-2017. Besides this, CHEMEXCIL in association with PLEXCONCIL had organized another Seminar on "Export / Import under GST Regime" on 3rd August, 2017 at New Delhi, wherein Senior Officials from the CBEC & DGFT were present. In the said Seminars, Officials from the Service Tax Department, CBEC and the DGFT enumerated on importance of GST covering its overview, Registration, Returns, Refunds, and GSTN etc. and interacted with the participants. To ensure that the effect of GST gets absorbed smoothly by the EXIM community, the GST Council had taken a deep insight into various aspects of Exports. CHEMEXCIL has been appropriately intimating our member-exporters on various updates on GST through its Circulars, SMS & Website.



The Mid-term review of the ForeignTrade Policy 2015-20 announced by the Ministry of Commerce & Industry on 5th December, 2017, after the GST roll-out, lays focus on policy measures to boost the exports of goods and services of all labour intensive/ MSME Sectors to increase employment generation and value-addition in the country.

You may also be aware that the new trust based Self Ratification Scheme introduced by the DGFT will allow duty free inputs for export production under duty exemption scheme with a self-declaration. Under this scheme, instead of getting a ratification of the Norms Committee for inputs to be used in the manufacture of export products, exporters will have to self-certify the requirement of duty free raw materials/ inputs and take an authorization from DGFT. The scheme will expedite export of new products by decreasing product turn-around time, particularly in sectors such as Chemicals, Pharmaceuticals, Textiles, Engineering and high technology which have dynamic raw material requirements. CHEMEXCIL is thankful to the Ministry of Commerce & Industry for taking the above steps for the benefit of its member-exporters. Currently, this scheme will be available only to AEO's and we hope the same will also be extended to other categories of exporters in the future.

During the Board of Trade meeting held on 20th June, 2017, CHEMEXCIL had submitted to the Department of Commerce and Industry, New Delhi various issues of the member-exporters, specially on Mid-term review of Foreign Trade Policy, 2015-2020 and re-aligning of FTP schemes in line with rollout of GST, Status of Export Incentives under GST Framework, Expansion of Interest Equalization Scheme by including more tariff Lines for non-MSMEs and cover Merchant Exporters, Import of technical pesticides, Solution for Persistent Technical Difficulties Related to DGFT Server/ Icegate/ BRC, Caution Listing of Exporters, Environment Related Controls, Business with Countries on OFAC List, etc. along with detailed presentation.

On 27th September-2017, the undersigned met our Hon'ble Union Minister of Commerce & Industry, Shri. Suresh Prabhu, at his office and discussed various GST related issues, specially Liquidity Problems faced by the member-exporters, processing of exporters' refunds under GST, Inclusion of Chapter 28 and 29 items under EU GSP, Enhanced incentive support to overcome Trade Barriers in Overseas Markets, etc. CHEMEXCIL had regularly taken up these issues with the concerned authorities for early redressal, wherein issues on LUT/ Bond/BG have been resolved to some extent.

Further, the GST Council, in its meetings held on 6th October and 10th November 2017, had recommended several facilitative changes and alignment of rates to ease the burden of compliance on small and medium businesses. Therefore, CHEMEXCIL is also thankful to the Ministry of Finance for coming out with Special fortnight/ refund drive in March 2018 for facilitating liquidation of pending IGST/un-utilized ITC on exports.

It may be noted that the Government is taking strict measures to cut out the challenges faced by the industry and coming up with new projects and plans to leverage all the opportunities to the maximum. Further, in order to tackle issues faced by the Indian Chemical industry, such as



feedstock unavailability, lack of access to latest technology & R&D and unfavorable/ inverted duty structures which have led to a few hiccups faced in the manufacturing and thus, exports of chemicals, the Government's initiative of "Make in India" would also play a pivotal role in promoting manufacturing of chemicals in India and increase its exports. To augment these efforts, CHEMEXCIL is also playing an active role towards helping its member-exporters in increasing their exports.

I am sure; the concerted efforts being taken by the Government, CHEMEXCIL and our memberexporters will not only boost exports of the items covered by the Council in the near future, but will also enhance competitive position in the global export market.

As part of export promotional activities, CHEMEXCIL had already implemented a lot of such activities with the active support and co-ordination with the Ministry of Commerce & Industry and various Indian Missions abroad, which included participation in Exhibitions & Buyer-Seller Meets in India and abroad (viz. CHEMSPEC Europe, FCI Trade Summit, CAC China, China Interdye, CHEMSPEC India, etc.) for which CHEMEXCIL is thankful to all of them as well as our member-exporters for their active participation in these activities and we hope that the same will follow in future also. The main objective of organizing these events in the promising Markets is primarily to project India of 21st Century capable of supplying quality products and technologies of International Standard at competitive rates and thus, to further enhance existing India's Bilateral Trade relations to a greater heights as also to explore opportunities for setting up of joint ventures and technological collaborations in the fast transforming global markets.

I also take this opportunity to update you that the scheme for trade promotion and facilitation administered by the Department of Commerce, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, i.e. Market Development Scheme (MDA) has been discontinued from 1st April, 2017 but essential components of the MDA Scheme have been incorporated in DOC's another scheme i.e. Market Access Initiative Scheme (MAI). This will ensure continuous support to the deserving MSME member exporters in showcasing their products in overseas market through Council.

I have pleasure to inform you that I had a meeting with the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Maharashtra, Shri Devendra Fadnavis and the Hon'ble Minister for Industries and Mining, Shri. Subhash Desai, on 23rd July-2017, wherein there were useful discussions on various issues covering industrial, infrastructural and Konkan related Lote Parshuram, etc., both of whom took note of the said issues and assured me that the same will be resolved as fast as possible.

A high level delegation from European Chemicals Agency (ECHA), visited India from 1st to 3rd November 2017 and they visited Mumbai on 3rd Nov 2017. CHEMEXCIL being the nodal agency for REACH Registrations organized a Seminar on REACH 2018 at Mumbai on 3rd Nov 2017, which was attended by Shri Sudhanshu Pandey, Joint Secretary, Dept. of Commerce along with representatives from various industries, Associations, SMEs, testing laboratories, etc. In the said Seminar, Mr Geert Dancet, Executive Director, ECHA made presentation on 'Global status of REACH 2018' and assured CHEMEXCIL of resolving the problems being faced by the Indian



manufacturers-exporters. Followed by this, Dr. Dileep Wakankar, Chairman of REACH Committee, CHEMEXCIL also made a presentation on 'Current status of REACH Registration' and explained the problems being faced by the Indian manufacturers-exporters while registering their substances under REACH.

Also, as part of export promotional activity under MAI, CHEMEXCIL jointly with PLEXCONCIL, CAPEXIL & SHEFEXIL under the aegis of Ministry of Commerce & Industry, with the active support of the Ministry of Chemicals & Fertilizers, organized CAPINDIA 2018 from 22nd to 24th March, 2018 at Bombay Exhibition Centre, Mumbai, which was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Union Minister of Commerce & Industry, Shri Suresh Prabhu who was the Chief Guest at the said event.

Lastly, I take this opportunity to invite your suggestions/views, if any, on the export promotional activities of the Council so as to improve it further for the benefit of all of you.

Some of the major points discussed/decisions taken in the above meetings are listed below:

With regard to the status of 4th and 5th floor of Jhansi Castle Bldg., the Council had received Structural Audit Report which was circulated to the Building Committee members. The Builder, M/s. Prakriti Trading Pvt. Ltd. informed Chairman Shri. Satish Wagh that both the parties (M/s. Prakriti Trading Pvt. Ltd. & CHEMEXCIL) should search for suitable location for the Office first and then shall initiate on the deals related to the building. Accordingly, the Chairman, Executive Director and Assistant Director (Admin) visited few locations in Andheri, Mumbai.



- As per the decision of the CoA, TATA Strategic Management Group (TSMG), was entrusted
 the job of preparing the draft report of "CHEMEXCIL's 5 year Export Promotion Strategy and
 Vision Document". They have submitted the final report which has already been circulated
 to the members of the CoA and uploaded on website of the Council.
- After approval from the Bye Laws Committee & Committee of Administration and in consultation with the Company Secretary, the Council has submitted to the Ministry of Commerce & Industry final amended and modified Byelaws of the Council for their approval which is awaited.
- As part of export promotional activity under MAI, the 3rd Edition of CAPINDIA 2018 Exhibition

 a leading show for sourcing and networking event for the Chemicals, Plastics, Construction,
 Mining Industry and Allied products was successfully organized jointly by the 4 EPCs (viz. CHEMEXCIL, PLEXCONCIL, CAPEXIL & SHEFEXIL) under the aegis of Dept. of Commerce,
 Ministry of Commerce & Industry with the support of Deptt. of Chem & Petrochemicals,
 Ministry of Chem. & Fertilizers from 22nd to 24th March, 2018 at Bombay Exhibition Centre,
 Mumbai. The said Exhibition was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Union Minister of Commerce
 Industry Shri Suresh Prabhu. The 3-day exhibition was spread over 18,000 sq mt. This exhibition was grand success.
- The MAI Proposals for the events of the Council for 2018-19 which were submitted by the Council to the Ministry of Commerce & Industry were approved by them.
- The Chairman and the Vice-Chairman of CHEMEXCIL had a meeting with the Hon'ble Minister of Commerce & Industry, Shri Suresh Prabhu on 27th Sept., 2017 to discuss on various issues faced by member exporters related to trade. Accordingly, CHEMEXCIL had given a representation to the Hon'ble Minister for his consideration, copy of which is also uploaded on our website.
- The EU experts gave a presentation on REACH 2018 compliance and way forward. Another
 presentation on "REACH India's situation" was given by Dr. Dileep Wakankar, Chairman of
 REACH Committee of CHEMEXCIL. The Seminar was attended by over 65 participants.
- CHEMEXCIL had written a letter No. EPC/LIC/MOCF dtd.10th Jan 2018 to Shri Ananth Kumarji, Hon'ble Minister of Chemicals & Fertilizers, Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilizers, New Delhi with a note on various constraints faced by exporters in Chemical sector.
- The Council had been receiving lot of representations from its member-exporters on problems faced by them on refund of GST while exporting and also refund of accumulated un-utilized ITC on purchases. In this regard, taking cognizance of feedback received from them, the Council has been sending specific representations as well as combined representations of the member-exporters to Senior Officials of CBEC, DGFT, Commissioner of JNCH, IGST Helpdesk, ICEGATE etc. with a request to resolve the same favourably.



EXPORT PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

REACH:

A high level delegation from European Chemicals Agency (ECHA), visited India from 1st to 3rd November 2017 and they visited Mumbai on 3rd Nov 2017. CHEMEXCIL being the nodal agency for REACH Registrations, organized a Seminar on "REACH 2018 Compliance" at Mumbai on 3rd Nov 2017, which was attended by Shri Sudhanshu Pandey, Joint Secretary, Dept. of Commerce along with representatives from various industries, Associations, SMEs, testing laboratories, etc.

At this occasion, the booklet prepared under the EU CITD project on REACH Regulation, addressing SMEs was also released.

After completion of the third deadline of REACH registration (i.e. 31st May 2018), the Council will request its members to submit their claim forms for reimbursement of 50% of the ECHA fees as per the MAI guidelines.

REGISTRATION OF PRODUCTS ABROAD (AGRO CHEMICALS):

The Council received the applications from the member-exporter for registration of their agrochemical products abroad. The applications was recommended to Ministry of Commerce & Industry for disbursement of 50% of the registration charges for agrochemical products registered in various countries. Total amount reimbursed for one product of Rs. 2,04,447/-

The Council had received/processed final 30 MDA proposal from member - exporters for participating in export promotion activities as per details given below :




CHAPTERWISE- REGIONWISE EXPORTS FOR THE YEAR 2015-16, 2016-17 & 2017-18

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

Report on the Financial Statements:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **Basic Chemicals**, **Cosmetics** and **Dyes Export Promotion Council** (hereinafter referred as "the Council"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2018, the Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year then ended, and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements:

The Council's Committee of Administration is responsible for the matters stated in Section 134(5) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") with respect to the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Council in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Council and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility:

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We have taken into account the provisions of the Act, the accounting and auditing standards and matters which are required to be included in the audit report under the provisions of the Act and the Rules made thereunder.

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing specified under Section 143(10) of the Act. Those Standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and the disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal financial control relevant to the Council's preparation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of the accounting policies used and the reasonableness of the accounting estimates made by the Council's Directors, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the financial statements.

Opinion:

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Council as at 31st March, 2018 and its surplus for the year ended on that date.

Emphasis of Matter:

Without Qualifying we draw attention to the following matters in the Notes to the financial statements:



- a) Note No. 17.2(a) regarding premises occupied by the Council in Mumbai, in respect of which cheques aggregating to Rs.26,79,153 for 119 months (Previous Year Rs.25,30,820 for 107 months) have been sent to the landlord and duly acknowledged by them but not deposited by the them lying in the stale cheques account under "other current liabilities" to the extent cheques becoming stale, and
- b) The expenses in respect of code-activities are subject to sanction / confirmation of the Government of India and Grant-in-aid received from the Ministry of Commerce and Industry is subject to adjustments as may be necessary in view of any Government Audit observations, non/partial fulfillment of certain conditions, if any as may be observed by them for eligibility of such Grant-in- aid, clarifications by the Council and final decision of the Ministry. Such audit is pending for the years 2016-17 & 2017-18. (Refer Note No. 17.4).

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements:

- 1. As the Council is registered under section 8 of the Act, the clauses under the Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2016 ("the Order") are not applicable.
- 2. As required by Section 143(3) of the Act, we report that:
 - a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit.
 - b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Council so far as it appears from our examination of those books.
 - c) The Balance Sheet, the Statement of Income and Expenditure dealt with by this Report are in agreement with the books of account.
 - d) In our opinion, the aforesaid financial statements comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014.
 - e) In our opinion, Section 164(2) of the Act in respect of reporting on disqualification of the Directors as provided under section 164(2) of the Act is not applicable to the Council as it is registered under section 8 of the Act.
 - f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls over financial reporting of the Council and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate Report in "Annexure A."

- g) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with Rule 11 of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us:

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NOTES FORMING PART OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Significant Accounting Policies:

1.1 Council's Information:

The Council is registered under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 with the objective of promoting export activities in specified industries such as organic and inorganic chemicals, dyes, cosmetics and other allied products.

1.2 General:

- a) The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention, in accordance with applicable accounting standards and on the principle of a going concern.
- b) All income and expenses to the extent considered receivable and payable, respectively with reasonable certainty are accounted for on accrual basis.
- c) Membership subscription which remains unpaid as at the close of the year is not accounted for except the amount actually received out of such unpaid subscriptions approximately one month prior to the approval of the financial statements by the Committee of Administration.
- d) Entrance Fees receipts are credited to General Reserve.
- e) Library books are charged to Income & Expenditure Account in the year of purchase.

1.3 Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements is in conformity with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). It requires Committee of Administration to make estimates and assumptions that affects the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of financial statements and reported amounts of revenue and expenses for that year. Actual results could differ from these estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively.

1.4 Fixed Assets (Tangible and Intangible):

Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation/amortization without any adjustment for Government Grant received, if any, for their purchase.

1.5 Depreciation/Amortization and Impairment:

a) Depreciation on Fixed Assets is provided on written down value method at the useful life specified in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 (hereinafter referred to as the 'Act').

b) Impairment of Assets:

- i. The Council assesses the carrying amount of assets at each Balance Sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the Council estimates the recoverable amount of the assets. The recoverable amount is estimated as the higher of the net realizable value and the value in use with an impairment loss being recognized whenever the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount.
- ii. A previously recognized impairment loss on assets is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount, however not to the extent higher than the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognized in prior years.

1.6 Investments:

Non-current Investments are stated at cost less provision made for permanent diminution in their carrying value.

1.7 Revenue Recognition:

a) Contribution from Members:

Contributions receivable from Members for participation in Exhibition, Delegation, Seminar, Pre-Registration, Late Pre-Registration and Annual Maintenance Fees are recognized as income as and when the respective activities are completed and/or on receipt basis in view of uncertainty. The cost of Publications of the Council is charged to Statement of Income and Expenditure in the year of incurrence of such expenses and the income in respect of the same is taken into account as and when their sale is affected.

b) Government Grants:

Grants from Government are credited to Income and Expenditure Account on receipt basis as it is not possible to ascertain, the quantum of Grant due & receivable from/refundable to the Ministry of Commerce and Industry with reasonable certainty/accuracy.

1.8 Transaction in Foreign Currency:

Transactions in foreign currency are recorded at the rate of exchange in force at the time of occurrence of the transaction.

Monetary - Current assets and current liabilities in foreign currency at the year-end are stated at the rate of exchange in force as on that date and the resultant gain / (loss) is recognized in the Income and Expenditure Account.

1.9 Employee Benefits:

- a) Contribution for Provident Fund (based on a certain percentage of salary) is funded into an approved Trust.
- b) Gratuity is charged to Income and Expenditure Account on the basis of actuarial valuation as at the year end and funded into an approved Trust.



c) Leave Entitlement Benefits are provided for on the basis of actuarial valuation as at the year end.

1.10 Provision and Contingent Liabilities:

- a) Provisions are recognized for liabilities that can be measured only by using a substantial degree of estimation, if
 - a. The Council has a present obligation as a result of a past event;
 - b. A probable outflow of resources is expected to settle the obligation; and
 - c. The amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.
- b) Where some or all of the expenditure required to settle a provision is expected to be reimbursed by another party, such reimbursement is recognized to the extent of provision or contingent liability as the case may be, only when it is virtually certain that the reimbursement will be received.
- c) Contingent liability, if material, is disclosed in the case of:
 - a. A present obligation arising from a past event, when it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.
 - b. A possible obligation, unless the probability of outflow of resources is remote.

17. Notes to Financial Statements:

- 17.1 The Council (set-up by Ministry of Commerce & Industry, Govt. of India) has been registered as a Company under the provisions of the 'Companies Act, 1956 (hereinafter called as the "Act"). By virtue of the license granted to the Council by the Central Government under Section 25 (now governed by section 8 of the Companies Act 2013) of the 'Act' the word "LIMITED" is not required to be suffixed to its name. Further, the Council is continuing to hold the registration certificate under Section 12AA of the IncomeTax Act, 1961.
- 17.2 a) With regards to premises at Jhansi Castle, the Structural Audit carried out M/s. V.J. Joshi & Associates and as per their report dated 26th April, 2017, "The building is more than 70 years old and general overall observation indicates that the building is substantially deteriorated at many places and if urgent repairs are not done, it may lead to fatal accidents." Management is making efforts to carry out necessary repairs to be reimbursed by the Owners.
 - The Council is occupying premises at 4th floor (as sub tenant to IndianTrade Promotion Organization (ITPO)) and 5th floor (as statutory tenant) of Jhansi Castle, Cooperage Road, Mumbai 400001 since 1971. The Council is regularly paying rent to the statutory tenant (ITPO) for 4th floor and has made additional payment during the year to the ITPO as per the interim directions of the Honorable Bombay High Court in the case between ITPO and Prakriti Trading Company (Owner of Jhansi Castle) for fixation of Standard Rent (including permitted increases) amounting to Rs.4,276,231/- for the years from 1999 to 2018.
 - The Council is receiving notice of eviction for the 5th floor from time to time but the Owner has not filed any case against the Council in this regard.
 - b) The Council has decided to create sufficient funds for buying its own offices in Mumbai, Kolkata and Bangalore and accordingly funds are transferred from Surplus to Chemexcil Building Fund from time to time as considered appropriate by Committee of Administration.


